I believe all children should have the right to education,


So that maybe later on in life,

The play equipment, which includes a large swing, a trampoline and an interactive music and story ball, provides lots of fantastic learning opportunities for all our young people who need a tailored, individualised curriculum. We are thrilled that the Lord's Taverners were able to provide this grant for us as it will have such an impact on these young people and their learning and development.



Sir Michael Parkinson's comments were extremely heart-warming saying:

Thank you Emily!

The Bridge Secondary were visited by the Labour MP, Emily Thornberry, as part of the Queen's Commonwealth Canopy Tree Project. The Queen's Commonwealth Canopy (QCC) is a network of global forest conservation initiatives to mark Her Majesty's lifetime of service to the Commonwealth. Fifty thousand trees were donated to individuals and organisations across the UK to be planted, and we were lucky enough to be given one of them. Emily Thornberry had a tour of our school and presented us with a silver birch tree which our students helped her to plant. We look forward to watching it grow!







Research at The Bridge London

September saw the start of the second and final year of the cycle of the current research strategy. This year we have begun to develop our Reflective Practice at The Bridge Primary as well as begin the second cycle of Learning Communities. This year The Bridge Primary, Secondary and The ILS are working across eight topic areas to evaluate, develop and refine practice. There is also a group who are working on further developing projects developed during last year's Learning Communities. Hungerford and The Bridge Satellites will also look to begin developing a Learning Community cycle.

Early November saw the Training Centre host a multi-disciplinary conference on Interoception, the sense of the internal state of the body, which among other things, plays an import role in helping to understand and regulate emotion. Speakers including leading academics, school-based practitioners and therapists presented theoretical, clinical and practical implications of the latest research around interoception, to an audience of teachers and parents from across the UK. Poppy Bonsor and Jessica Hegarty were invited to share the Fun with Food programme at The Bridge Primary that has built upon our earlier research on Sensory Snack Time.

Sharing our research is a core component of our Research Strategy, and as well as presenting the work, the programme has now been written up and was accepted for publication in the journal 'Frontiers in Education'. It has accumulated over 1,500 views and we hope it will enable other settings to implement similar types of support for their pupils.

As well as continuing to embed the foundation components of the Research Strategy we will continue to develop new projects as well as evaluate existing ones. A new Research and Development Committee will be launched in the new year to oversee and help shape our growing research culture. We hope that 2019 will see the Research Strategy continue to embed itself within the Trust and lead to more exciting developments in practice, innovations and even greater engagement with and in research, from everyone at The Bridge London.

Updates from Penny Barratt

Teaching and Learning Group

Twice a term the Teaching and Learning Group meet. This is a meeting of all the Heads of School, the Assistant Heads and the lead therapists from all four schools. At these meeting we discuss things that apply to all of our schools, share ideas and learn from each other.

At the moment we are doing some exciting work on developing our approach to teaching and learning. Each of the schools has written a teaching and learning plan for their own school, but they are being supported by the other schools to put this into practice.

It's great to work together on this, learn together and support each other.

The Bridge London Trust and Positive Behaviour Support (PBS)

Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) is an approach to behaviour which we are using in all of our schools. We are working with a PBS coach from the Netherlands. In each school we have a PBS team of 4-5 people who oversee the PBS work at the school. This in-school team receive training each term and then write an action plan for what they hope to achieve that term. They meet regularly and have regular times to discuss PBS with all staff.

We will keep you updated on what we are doing with PBS in future newsletters.

Learning Environments at Hungerford School and The Bridge School

Stephen Heppell is an English educator who specialises in the development of learning environments. He has worked internationally with Olympic teams, schools, universities and businesses to maximise the environments for learning. The Bridge School and Hungerford School are part of a network of ten schools who together commissioned him to come to Islington to visit our schools and give us his thoughts on how we could improve our learning environments.

On 28th September, Stephen spoke to the school staff at the Islington Assembly Rooms. Before this he had visited the school and taken photos of areas where we could make improvements. His presentation used photographs to illustrate specific things on our site, but also environments that have been created in other learning institutions around the world. When he walked around our schools he considered the lighting, temperature, using ICT for learning, and other ways of encouraging learning by changing the environment. The talk left us inspired and motivated so we have started to improve our environment by assigning project teams to different areas of the school to enhance what we currently have in place. One of the ideas was to improve the levels of oxygen in our school by adding more plants so we had 'bring a plant to school week'. Let's see what else the project teams come up with!
